Forward

The Association of African Universities is proud and privileged to be associated with Professor Etienne Ehouan Ehile, an astute academic who served as its Secretary General for the period August 2012 - September 2021. Overall, the AAU has had 10 Secretaries-General in its 54 years of existence, and Prof. Ehile is the 10th. Prof. Ehile was not entirely new to the AAU before this period, as he had served the Association in the capacity of an AAU Governing Board Member (2005 - 2012) representing the West Africa Region.

During his nine (9) year stay at the AAU Secretariate, headquartered in Accra Ghana, he proved to be a true Pan-African Icon devoted to leading the transformation of the Higher Education sector, and working with stakeholders to solve its long-standing challenges. Prof. Ehile made significant contributions to the higher education sector, helping raise its profile and competitiveness. We highlight the top 10 achievements of Prof. Ehile during his stay as the Secretary General of the AAU as follows:

1. **STRATEGIC DIRECTION** – Prof Ehile oversaw the development of two strategic plans for the Association: 2016/2020 and 2021/2025

2. **VISIBILITY OF AAU** – Under his leadership, the AAU's visibility increased tremendously, through his strong support for communications and its various channels including social media, the AAU Newsletter, AAU Television, and vibrant websites. AAU previously did not use social media nor have an e-newsletter

3. **DECENTRALIZATION OF AAU FUNCTIONS** – Prof. Ehile recorded this remarkable

achievement through the establishment of AAU regional offices in East Africa, North Africa and North America. This strategy is making the Association's programmes more relevant in responding to specific regional needs. Further, it is increasing the ownership of the Association by the members. Desk Officers were also appointed in member institutions to improve the communication between the Secretariat and AAU members

4. CAPACITY BUILDING FOR AFRICAN

UNIVERSITIES – During his tenure, the workshops strategy was strengthened to increase the number of participants who benefitted from the AAU's capacity building trainings. The number of Face -to- Face workshops held, as well as the diversity of training areas covered, all shot up in line with meeting the needs of stakeholders of African Universities. During the COVID19 era we saw the Secretariat training 40,163 individuals virtually between 1st July 2020 to 13 April 2021

5. **NEW PARTNERS** – The partnership with the World Bank was brokered in 2014 and has been renewed for the current Africa Higher Education Centres of Excellence for Development Impact (ACE Impact) Project. This partnership is worth US\$350 million and is supporting the transformation of Africa's higher Education. Other partners nurtured by Prof Ehile were Carnegie Corporation, The International Development Research Centre (IDRC) and Education Sub-Saharan Africa (ESSA).



6. **INNOVATIVE PROJECTS** – Prof Ehile oversaw the establishment of the AAU Television, the online African Jobs Board Platform, the implementation of Virtual Meetings Platforms and the AAUeLearnAfrica Learning Management System.

7. HOSTING COUNTRY RELATIONSHIP – The relationship with the Government of Ghana has continued to be strengthened. Prof Ehile oversaw the construction of the current AAU Secretariat building and the Secretary General's residence, which were both gifts from the host country

8. **STAFFING** – The strategy to recruit interns has helped to cover the staffing gaps. Prof Ehile negotiated with the Government of Ghana so that National Service Persons would be assigned to the Secretariat at the cost of the Government of Ghana.

9. **FUNDING** – Funding was stabilized during his term of office through the prudent use of resources. The staff End of Service Benefits savings account was established to ensure that when staff disengage from the AAU, they are immediately paid their dues. An endowment fund has also been established for the Association

10. **ADVOCACY** – Prof Ehile continued to advocate for the building of resilient Higher Education Institutions by engaging African Ministries of Higher Education and Regional Research and Education Networks



We sincerely thank Prof. Ehile for laying this solid foundation upon which the sector will continue to thrive. We wish him well in his retirement and hope that though he is stepping out of his role as the Secretary General, he is not stepping out of the higher education scene. We pray for a rejuvenated energy to enable him provide consultancy services to higher education stakeholders, both on the continent and beyond, for the benefit of Africa's development.

We also appreciate all our stakeholders who submitted their well wishes, reminiscing about their engagement with Prof. Ehile and wishing him well in the next phase of his life. From All of us at the AAU Secretariate, with lots of love!!!



Biography

Prof Etienne Ehouan Ehile is an Ivorian and a renowned physiologist. He graduated from the Faculty of Sciences of the University of Abidjan in 1974, where he obtained his Master's degree. He then joined the University of Aix Marseille III (France) and obtained his Doctorate in Neurophysiology with honors in 1978. His research work was carried out at the Neurophysiology Laboratory of the National Center for Scientific Research (CNRS), France.

He is the former Director of Cabinet of the Ministry of Health and Public Hygiene of Côte d'Ivoire and former President of Nangui Abrogoua University, Côte d'Ivoire, where he spent two terms of 4 years each (2001-2010), before assuming the role of Secretary General of the Association of African Universities (AAU) in August 2011.

Professor Ehile has published over 50 scientific articles in various regional and international scientific journals from 1978 to 2019. From 1992 to date, Professor Ehile has held numerous managerial and administrative positions.

The initiative for building a dedicated secretariat was actually initiated by my predecessor at the AAU, Prof. Akilagpa Sawyerr, and I followed the matter up with the Government of Ghana when I was Secretary-General. Prof. Ehilé, and all those closely associated with the AAU, must be proud of finally having a spacious and modern secretariat for the Association.

Second, he effected the decentralisation of the AAU by establishing regional offices in different regions of Africa. Again, the idea of

decentralisation had been mooted a few decades earlier but there was always some reluctance at the Board level in seeing it through.

Prof. Ehilé was able to overcome the various

administrative and diplomatic hurdles to finally make

decentralisation a reality. His successor will have the task of ensuring that the Association derives the full benefits expected from the decentralisation process. In my capacity as a former

Secretary-General of the AAU, I wish to congratulate Prof. Ehilé for all his achievements, and to thank him for

his long and dedicated service to the Association. I wish him well in whatever he undertakes in the next phase of his career.

All these you have bequeathed without complaining, with personal sacrifice and a focused commitment to serve.




Opening up an office in the United States of America and its attendant structure,

Association meritoriously from 2012 to 2021. Professor Ehile was my successor when I had to leave rather abruptly and reluctantly, at the instance of the Government of Kogi State of Nigeria, to assist in the administration of the State as Secretary to Government.

Professor Ehile, a humble administrator, a quiet achiever and an astute academic, performed creditably well in many respects while in office,

to the admiration of many, especially those of us who were interested in the sustenance of the Association. Let me make reference to three of such instances.

Professor Ehile's tenure promoted the growth and development of the AAU

It is on record, especially in Africa, that Vice Chancellors are a difficult cohort of people to manage. You not only have to win them over on your issues with superior argument, you also must bend over backwards to follow it up with personal discussions on how their universities stand to benefit in whatever ideas you put across to the generality of membership. Professor Ehile performed well in this regard.

I must also commend him for his posture on continuity of projects by predecessors. For the first time in the 53 years of the existence of the AAU, I approached the Government of Ghana early in 2012 to stop paying the annual rent for the Secretariat of the AAU and the Secretary

> General's residence. I requested that the Government should instead provide us with the money to build our Secretariat and residence. The President of Ghana graciously accepted my request and gave us the money. I began the acquisition of the land, called for expression of interest and submission of drawings and tenders by Ghanaian universities with the capacity to do so. Professor Ehile continued with this project and by the grace of God,

AAU now has an imposing Secretariat as well as the SG's Residence at the back of the Secretariat.

He also continued with the World Bank supported Centres of Excellence which my administration initiated and today we have over 50 of such centres thriving on the continent.

On behalf of my family and myself, I wish Professor Ehile a wonderful rest and a stress-free engagement in his future endeavour. AAU and Africa and indeed the International Development agencies that fund AAU's projects will continue to remember his tenure as one of sustaining the growth and development of the Association.



I got to know Professor Etienne Ehile in 2015 when we were preparing the proposal for HAQAA (Harmonisation, Accreditation and Quality Assurance in Africa), the EU-funded project in which the

AAU participates as African partner. I've been in close contact with him during HAQAA-1's implementation and HAQAA-2's (2019-2022) preparation and implementation.

Professor Ehile taught all of us how to think in terms of Continental African Higher Education

and how to work in its favour.

This is not easy: Africa is an extremely complex continent with four levels of policy definition and implementation of Higher Education policy: that of the Universities and Higher Education institutions themselves (more or less autonomous), that of national Governments and Parliaments, that of the Regional Economic Communities and that of the African Union and its different institutions.

These four levels overlap and the challenge is that of creating synergies between them and avoiding contradictions and doubles-emplois. We learned from Professor Ehile how to organize our thinking and our action in order to face this challenge.




